Do you live in an old stone house?

Transition Buxton is taking part in a project run by Rural Action Derbyshire to assess the energy losses in local old stone houses (many of which are in Buxton). These houses are notoriously expensive to heat, since they have no cavities to fill and can sometimes have restrictions with regard to double-glazing.

Rural Action Derbyshire is bidding for a grant to help fund the training of more voluntary energy assessors who, on

request by homeowners will calculate the amount of energy lost by the house and show how much energy can be saved by making changes around the house, some of which can be quite inexpensive.



2011 Highlights

Last year was a very busy year for TB; we ran a number of events and workshops, here's just some of them:

January began with frost-bitten toes manning the Recycle Christmas stall. The February seed swap was also chilly, but if you have any spare seeds just bring them along to Green Drinks on the last Wednesday of any month. March heralded the first planting of our



pruning workshop took place on January 8th this year.

April was brightened up by a "Jazz up vour Jacket" workshop which was complemented by a talk by Helen Jagger

about sustainable fabrics.

A very well-attended debate about the Buxton-Matlock railway line was the highlight of May. Experts from diverse interest groups gave their views and fi elded guestions from the audience. For the detail consult our web-site, it makes interesting reading.

In June we had a very interesting visit to the Waterswallows recycling site, when we saw at first hand how our waste is treated. We found out then that the composting procedure couldn't cope with complex cardboard items, i.e. anything with coatings (that's the reason for the changes to waste collections) and that everything in your black bin goes to an incinerator near Stoke.

Transition Buxton was well-represented at Festival time too; Connie Consumasaurus went in the carnival procession, where she nabbed 2 prizes. Also Funny Wonders (the



puppet show people) put on a fantastic performance around a story based around the transition movement.

Funny Wonders also took part in our "Spend Less Smile More" event in October, providing puppet-making and musical



instrument workshops. The day was aimed at encouraging people to grow their own food, use less energy and make textile items so saving money. Peak Organics showed the produce from

their allotments, and Hannah conjured up a team of super-models and treated us to a frankly amazing "trashion" show. Another interesting workshop we ran, was charcoal burning on a domestic scale. We collected the wood on the way, saw how it was done and sampled sausages cooked on the results afterwards. All you need is an old dustbin, some wood and a little time.

Supermarket Sweep

You'll all have noticed that Tesco has withdrawn their planning application, though we expect them to re-apply in the fullness of time.

We would only like to draw your attention to the fact that these huge supermarkets do nothing to help the environment, as they encourage widespread waste of food that does not quite reach their standards of

shape and size; they use vast amounts of fuel transporting goods from all over the world, when we want to encourage local produce to be used; they force farmers to accept low payments; they destroy small local businesses by diversifying into every possible area of retail. We would advocate developments that enhance the town for example Railway expansion, an indoor market or leisure centre for this site.
