

Community Orchard Expands

Transition Buxton started in earnest with planting a dispersed community orchard early in 2011, and has added to the orchard every winter since then.

We now have well over 50 trees in the town spread across several sites.

The majority are apple but we also have pear, cherry, greengage, plum and damson. We're trialling different varieties to see which do best in the Buxton climate.

The latest additions, this summer, were some fruit bushes in Cote Heath Park.

New Members' Meetings

In September, we started a new monthly members' meeting, whose purpose is to give Transition Buxton (TB) members a forum for discussion. It takes place on the 2nd Tuesday of the month and until Christmas will be held in Buxton Civic Association's schoolroom, which is based at Poole's Cavern.

At the first meeting, Jean Ball, who chaired the meeting, explained that although Transition Buxton has achieved a huge amount in the 8 years of its existence, it could now do with building momentum. These meetings have been created so that more members can get together to throw ideas about and actively create ways of reaching more of the general public.

Those present at the meeting were very concerned about Climate Change and the fact that most Buxtonians ignore this subject completely. Therefore, they would like to reinvigorate awareness of this phenomenon and help people to achieve ways of lessening their energy use.

Some years ago, we held a successful workshop on making thermally lined curtains; it was suggested that this could be repeated. Another idea broached was to help homes improve insulation, firstly by pinpointing heat loss areas using a thermal imaging camera and secondly by helping householders gain the required DIY knowledge. We would like to encourage the University of Derby to run such Adult Education courses.

It was also felt that we should aim to show more educational films per year and arrange visits to relevant venues such as Derbyshire Eco Centre or Godley Reservoir, which already has a floating solar panel array.

They also wanted to encourage HPBC to improve recycling facilities e.g. include recycling of tetrapaks and give better facilities for businesses, who currently pay extra. Basically, if you would like to get more involved with these themes or have skills you

are keen to share with others, please do come along to one of these meetings.

One positive result from the last two meetings is that we have two new members of the TB Awareness Raising committee, which produces these newsletters, sets up talks and films, updates the website and organizes general information leaflets as part of its current remit.

Change of Directors

Highlights since AGM

May Day saw us battling the elements, trying to keep our stall from blowing away. However, at least in the afternoon there was a little sunshine, which encouraged a few visitors to look at Connie and take part in a few games.

Unfortunately, the display boards were damaged, but we managed to get them repaired in time for the Open Gardens event in June. where they were displayed in Christchurch, Burbage.

At the end of May we held our annual Plant Swap, which was quite well attended.

"Is Technology the key to combatting Climate Change?"

Dr Paul Beers set us this question in his allencompassing presentation on October 19th.

"Climate change is the overriding, most important environmental issue of our time." says the UN Secretary General.

There is also increasing evidence that we are at a tipping point where irreversible changes to the ecosystem are upon us.


Paul is an expert on the Low Carbon **Environmental Goods and Services Sector** who specialises in advising on the skills reguired for a low carbon economy. He has chaired the UK Forum for Environmental Industries Skills Interest group, and been an Independent Ministerial Advisor on this subject.

In his presentation, he covered all the main causes of global warming, how well UK is doing with regard to reducing carbon levels compared to targets and also many of the new technologies, either in use or proposed, to combat climate change.

He detailed sustainable energy production from wind, solar, hydro, tidal and nuclear sources. One of the tidal collectors is shown here.

He also touched on our own new floating solar

panel project, which was described by Janet Miller (please check our website). Janet mentioned that representatives from DEFRA, who have promised funding, visited the site at Waterswallows recently, and were very impressed by the potential of the location.



Paul went on to describe the technology associated with agriculture, such as the production of biofuels from anaerobic digestion such as bio-alcohol and bio-diesel. Bio-diesel is mainly manufactured from waste vegetable oils so would not harm food production. Finally, he covered advances in private transport, such as the hydrogen-fuelled car, an example of which is shown below.



In answer to his original question, he said that he believed technology will not solve the problem, alone, but it is necessary for everyone to change their habits. He recommended that everyone should do a calculation of their own carbon use using one of the free calculators.
