

'We Are Buxton'

The loudest theme that emerged from Big Buxton Conversation One (BBC1) in April was the need for better communication between the various Buxton groups and the Borough and County Councils. Although we are blessed with many passionate local people and voluntary groups doing great work, Buxton does not have a town or parish council so there has been no forum to focus on the town. Following BBC1 we are pleased to be part of a new forum to bring together the two local authorities, and representatives of nine groups; Transition Buxton, Buxton Town Team, Vision Buxton, BCA, Churches Together in Buxton, Accessible Buxton, Buxton Street by Street and the Residents Associations for Harpur Hill and Fairfield. This new group met for the first time in September and will meet again in November and every couple of months. We are quite excited about this change as we firmly believe that communication leads to collaboration, and it is through collective action that we can build our resilience and shape the change we choose. The "Buxton Cup" has arrived!

The Buxton Cup is a dishwasher safe pint "glass" that can be used again and again, personalized, and, when eventually worn out, it can of course be recycled. So, by using the "Buxton Cup" whilst enjoying your beer (or the beverage of your choice), you can make a difference to the amount of rubbish discarded.



Wherever single use plastic glasses are used at outdoor events and festivals, this cup is the solution. It prevents the need for single use plastic that rarely gets recycled and usually goes to landfill. The reusable Buxton Cup remains a good

idea even if single use plastic glasses are increasingly the compostable versions. The claim that packaging is 'compostable' does not mean that it will get composted, and single use just doesn't make sense when there is an alternative.

Community Orchard

The autumn planting season is nearly upon us and we hope to extend the orchard significantly this year. We have plans to create a new site within the Orchard, planting at least three apple trees at the far end of Sherwood Road - hopefully some more later. We will also be planting more trees at the Cote Heath Park site, which will make this our biggest 'mini-orchard'; and at least another three trees at Gadley Lane.

We shall be needing more people to act as **Tree Guardians**, to look after a group of trees. It only takes a few hours a year. If you have knowledge about pruning and general maintenance of fruit trees we would be especially interested to hear from you.






Support the Climate and Ecological Emergency Bill

In September, Transition Buxton endorsed a High Peak campaign in support of the Climate and Ecological Emergency bill.

Drafted by scientists, legal experts, ecological economists and environmentalists, the CEE Bill is designed to reverse the climate and ecological breakdown we're facing.



Transition Buxton is a hands-on group dedicated to taking concrete actions to make life in our town sustainable, reducing our negative impacts on the planet and increasing our well-being.

But the joint climate and nature emergencies we are facing also demand action at national and international level.

We believe that the CEE bill provides the legal framework that would commit this and future governments to the transformative changes we need.

The Bill requires the UK to take responsibility for its fair share of greenhouse gas emissions, to actively restore biodiverse habitats, and to stop damaging our natural world through the production, transportation and disposal of the goods we consume

It requires the government to seek nature-based solutions, rather than relying on unproven technologies. In our area, this would mean stable and secure investment in the restoration and good management of our peatlands. Recent studies show that millions of tonnes of Carbon are stored in peat in the Peak District. Healthy peatlands are also one of the world's most diverse natural habitats. With restoration of degraded moors and good management, our peatlands could play their part in averting catastrophe!

We are calling on our MP Robert Largan to join the 118 MPs who have pledged their support for the CEE bill.

Repair Café

Nine Repair Cafés have taken place, starting in September 2019 until the Covid lockdown in March 2020 and; after much discussion and planning around social distancing procedures; restarting in May 2021.


The first few sessions this year have been quieter than before, but numbers are gradually picking up. So far we have processed a total of 282 items, of which 150 have been repaired and a further 42 have been improved, or advice given as to how to fix them e.g. what to ask a specialist repairer to do, or what parts are required (often much cheaper than buying a new item). Only 48 items (mostly electrical) were unrepairable.


Some reasons for repair were frayed wires causing bad connections; broken switches; need for a new plug, fuse or battery; requirement for a judicious application of specialist glue; and sometimes just a bit of fluff in the wrong place! Some of the reasons for non-repair of electrical items were new parts being more expensive than the cost of the item, not being able to gain access to carry out a repair, and damage caused by leaking batteries.

It is estimated that the 192 items rescued from going to landfill represent a saving of over 4.6 tonnes of CO₂ emissions!

We have been proud to repair some treasured items - especially ornaments painstakingly restored to almost new by Gill (our ceramics expert), a few old clocks and a beautiful wooden bagatelle board. Other objects given a further lease of life include sewing machines, vacuum cleaners, radios, CD players, lamps, hairdryers, toasters, hedge-trimmers, bicycles, shopping trolleys and a drone! Not to mention numerous replaced zips, darned holes in jumpers and patched knees in jeans.

We are fortunate to have such a skilled group of fixers, who enable us to help so many people.

Education Outreach



Our £2,000 Great Big Green Week Grant from the Climate Coalition has enabled us to buy some education resources for use with schools and community groups and some publicity banners.

We have also used the monies to organise a **Buxton Schools' COP26 Conference** for Thurs, 4th November with students focusing on climate issues and engaging in debates and decision making.

Where has Billie Bee been recently?

Billie Bee has been to the Great Dome Art Fair, then the Buxton Wild Weeks Stall at the Environment Fair in the Octagon, and been to the Brownies and Rainbows where he inspired them to make mini bug hotels from baked bean cans.



The Climate Pathfinders Youth Forum members had their first stall and live presentation at the Rotary Environment Fair. They have built 2 bug hotels in the New Mills Orchard. 3 of our members have joined the Friends of the Earth planning for their Youth Summit on Green Jobs.

The Brownies and Scouts have been learning about their own carbon footprint and what steps they can take to reduce this. They have also been "thinking outside the bin" and undertaking the 10 R challenge to do lots of things with their rubbish before they put it in the recycle bin.

Safeguarding

Activities with young people and children is a big part of our Education Outreach. Our TB Safeguarding Policy is reviewed regularly and available on our website. Any TB members who engage with children or young people are asked to inform us and to refer to the Policy. Our TB Insurance covers activities with children and young people.
