## **Plastic Free Community Award**

Transition Buxton has been working hard with partners across the town to achieve Plastic Free Community status as part of our commitment to Buxton becoming a more sustainable community.

Now, we are excited to announce that Buxton has joined a network of 165 communities across the UK who are leading the way to tackle throw away plastic at source. The town has been awarded Plastic Free Community status by marine conservation charity, Surfers Against Sewage (SAS), in recognition of the work we have done to start reducing the impact of single-use plastic on the environment.

The response from everyone has been fantastic. We now have businesses, schools and community groups throughout the town working to reduce their single use plastic, waste and emissions. Partners have committed to; removing polystyrene packaging, replacing plastic with cardboard, refilling and reusing plastic containers, one school has even removed a million plastic bottles from waste each year and installed water fountains.



Towards a sustainable community

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Derek Bodey commented "It's been a wonderful community effort to reach this milestone but it's only the start. I want to thank the Transition Buxton Plastic Group for all the hard work and effort they have put to get here. However, we want more and more businesses and community groups to sign up - the journey continues definitely continues "

Rachel Yates, SAS Plastic Free Communities Project Manager, said: "It's great to see the work that Buxton has done to reduce the availability of avoidable plastics, raise awareness and encourage people to refill and reuse. We have over six hundred communities across the UK working to reduce single use plastic and the impact it has on our environment. Every step those communities and the individuals in them take is a step towards tackling the problem at source, challenging our throwaway culture and encouraging the habit and system changes we need to see."

#### **REWILDING HOGSHAW SIDINGS**

Starting the process of rewilding Hogshaw Sidings embankment (the old tip) was a lovely way for three community groups to come together on the morning of 27 March. The Friends of Buxton Station (FoBS) were joined by kind folk from Friends of Hogshaw and Buxton Civic Association's Woodland Group.



Together, we lifted three "hippo" bags of mostly plastic litter, pulled up and composted around 180 dead trees and stood a large number of fallen trees back upright, replacing their damaged "rabbitproof" protection. More work to rewild the plot of land will follow with High Peak BC's permission and input from Network Rail's Consultant Ecologist. Network Rail constructed the embankment when excavating the sidings in 2019, operating under strict Planning Conditions to enhance the habitat imposed by the then Secretary of State for Transport. One Condition required a clear 5-year Ecological Management Plan, under the control of a & Gil Boardman. Thanks BCA Woodlanders - Sheila Project Ecologist. The former tip site is owned by High Peak Borough Council, who have provided permission for FoBS to undertake rewilding activities.

FoBS have sought advice on their plans from Steve Orridge, an Amateur Buxton Naturalist and Hollie Fisher of Derbyshire Wildlife Trust. The litter pick was Stage 1 of the plan, further investigation on soil pH and "wetness" will guide the future planting and seeding to provide fruiting and flowering plants to help our local pollinators.

### **RECYCLING TOYS**

We have recently signed up to a new Terracycle scheme for broken and damaged toys and games. This category includes items from all brands in plastic, metal, wood, cardboard or paper (examples are shown in the picture). The following items are not accepted:

- x Electronic toys and games
- x Batteries and battery operated toys and games
- **x** Baby and toddler furniture (e.g. car seats, high chairs, bouncy seats etc.)
- x Toy vehicles (e.g. bicycles, scooters, skateboards)
- x Toys and games in good condition
- x Soft toys

The important point to note is that you will just be able to drop off these items at one collection point (the location of which we are finalising at the moment). PLEASE DO NOT PUT THESE ITEMS IN ANY OF THE EXISTING COLLECTION BINS AROUND THE TOWN. Watch this space for where you can recycle your broken toys!



### **'WE ARE BUXTON' FORUM**

The We Are Buxton Forum is made up of 7 active local groups working collaboratively for our collective benefit. The groups meet every 6 weeks or so and for alternate meetings we are joined by senior HPBC and DCC Members and officers. The Forum, currently Chaired by Transition Buxton, is proving really useful and practical in lots of ways. Two topics worth mentioning here are:


- Bountiful Buxton (working title); we are in early stage discussions about a possible not for profit / community unit in The Springs that would support local vibrancy and well being.
- As a place with no Town or Parish Council we feel that HPBC elected Members for Buxton Wards should meet and work together for the town, regardless of party. To date they take part in lots of Borough wide meetings and meet by party, but not by town. We have been asking candidates in the May elections to respond to this request in hope of changing this.

We Are Buxton is also engaged with HPBC about the plans for improvements in the Spring Gardens area using Future High Street grant funding, and other possible changes to our built environment, review of the Local Plan, as well as issues like High Path. Transition Buxton will continue to speak up for environmentally positive priorities at the heart of every plan, project and decision.

## Do You Want a Lamp Post Charge Point Near Your Home or Work?

To support motorists in Derbyshire to make the switch to cleaner, greener vehicles Derbyshire County Council are planning to install up to 500 on-street electric vehicle charging points on lamp posts in areas of the county where residents have no off-road parking. They will run from the electricity supply to street lights.

They are asking residents to come forward to help identify where charge points could be installed by registering their interest.

### Library of Things

Waiting is one of the hardest things to do. We're reasonably confident that our Library of Things (LoT) will be hosted at Buxton Library but at the moment we're waiting for Derbyshire County Council's Health and Safety department to approve our proposal. Our proposal has the backing of staff at Buxton library and of their line manager. We have submitted our own risk assessment and the terms and conditions that will apply to the Library of Things and we hope this will speed up the process.



In the meantime, we've been looking around for lockable storage units. Graham Winter has got agreement from the Palace Hotel to let us have some lockers and they are kindly holding on to these for us until we hopefully can move them to the Library. We'll definitely need more, but at the moment are on-hold as we don't have any space to store them. If you know about any storage units whose owners would be happy to hang on to them for a little while, we'd be really interested to hear from you.

We have a good idea of how we'll operate, our membership terms, fees/donations and the types of items that we think will be popular. We're mostly waiting for our home. Meanwhile we are still on the look out for someone to design a logo or brand for the LoT, if you have some design skills you'd be willing to contribute to this initiative we'd really like to hear from you.

One item we have decided to splash out on without more ado is a tablet to run aspects of the LoT, such as inventory, reserving, checking in and out, and membership. We hope to have the tablet with the software installed to demo the LoT to visitors to our upcoming stalls.


### **Testing The Waters**


